What is a FIP?

There are 26 FIPs including over 150 VET qualifications.

Each FIP will include one or more VET qualifications at Certificate
II or III level

Some qualifications are delivered 'on-job' (traineeship or apprenticeship) or 'off-job' (classroom-based learning)

Most qualifications are delivered one day per week, unless you decide you want to set it up as a traineeships/apprenticeship which includes employment one day per week minimum(7.5 hrs)

FIPs in SACE

Students can begin their FIP in year 10 (through an apprenticeship or traineeship only), year 11 or year 12.

VET courses within FIPs contribute to completion of the SACE.

Students who begin a FIP may move between different pathway options during secondary school.

Students on a FIP may also transition from year 12 to further study or higher education (university).

What are schoolbased apprenticeships and traineeships (SBAT)? Students can commence an apprenticeship or traineeship in years 10, 11 or 12 for qualifications that are delivered "on the job".

SBATs combine senior secondary school with vocational education and training (VET) and paid employment.

Student attend school for agreed subjects, participate in onthe-job training in the workplace and formal VET with a Registered Training Organisation (RTO)

Learning in school and attending work is balanced between the needs of the student, the employer and the school.

VET/SBAT can provide up to 150 of the 200 required SACE credits.

What is the difference between an apprenticeship and a traineeship?



Both allow you to learn while you earn. You train on the job, study and earn an income all while working towards a qualification.



An apprenticeship normally takes 3-4 years in traditional trade areas like carpentry, electrical, hairdressing and plumbing.



A traineeship lasts 1-2 years, in areas such as office administration, information technology or hospitality.

Who is involved in the process?



Parent or Caregiver

Sign the Training Contract and Training Plan (legal paperwork) if student is under 18.



Employer

Provides an offer of employment to start a SBAT. Train and monitor throughout your SBAT. Negotiate to work around school requirements.



School

Approve the SBAT before commencement. Facilitate details of the employment and training. Negotiate a school timetable to fit with your SBAT.

VET Readiness Orientation (VETRO)

All students will be required to complete VETRO to access VET qualifications as part of the FIP.

Online enrolment process which involves registration and evidence of pathway readiness.

Helps identify any support that a student may need to commence and complete their pathway.




An Australian Citizen

Enrolled in Year 10, 11 or 12 and employed in a Training Contract that combines VET and schoolbased curriculum including SACE Enrolled in Year 11, 12 or 13



- Are undertaking SACE or equivalent and,
- Have completed a preparatory VET pathway

The cost of VET courses





Schools will pass on course costs to families where the student is not a school card recipient (range \$50 - \$1000)

Families who are eligible school card recipients may be charged a nominal/administrative fee only up to \$100

Timeline

Term 3

- Attend relevant VET information sessions at school
- Complete EOI, CTP and industry evidence(email to Bek)
- Bek to enrol students in VETRO Part A
- STUDENT CAN NOW PICK VET STREAM in Web preferences
- RTO completes Part B
- Family completes Part C
- Complete Literacy and Numeracy assessment with RTO

Term 4

- Once accepted complete RTO enrolment paperwork
- Adjust 2023 timetable to accommodate VET day/s
