

What is the SACE

• The South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) is a modern, internationally-recognised secondary school qualification designed to equip you with the skills, knowledge, and personal capabilities to successfully participate in our fast-paced global society.

• You'll be awarded the SACE if you successfully complete requirements that include a range of skills and subjects you may study at school or may have acquired through other education, training or experience.



SACE Terminology

• **Stage 1** – Year 11

• **Stage 2** – Year 12

• Stage 1 subjects are Semester subjects and worth 10 credits

• Stage 2 subjects are full year subjects and worth 20 credits

Students must achieve 200 credits over the two stages

SACE Requirements

Total compulsory requirements are worth 50 credits.

Students need to choose other subjects or courses worth 150 credits (minimum)

Compulsory Subjects

- To achieve your SACE you must complete these compulsory requirements with a C grade or higher at Stage 1, and a C- grade or higher at Stage 2:
- Exploring Identities and Futures completed in Year 10
- a Mathematics subject in Year 11- semester
- an English subject in Year 11 full year
- Research Project completed in Year 11



Recognised Learning

SACE subjects aren't the only way to get the required credits for SACE

Students can also earn credits through recognised learning, such as VET or community learning

Community Learning

- Includes community-directed programs or self-directed programs approved by the SACE Board, e.g.
 - Air Force or Army Cadets
 - Australian Music Examinations Board
 - Duke of Edinburgh's Award
 - SANFL umpiring
 - Operation Flinders
 - Royal Life Saving Society
 - Scouts or Guides
- Can count towards a maximum of 90 credits of community learning at Stage 1 and/or Stage 2
- The number of credits each program is allocated is decided by the SACE Board

Thinking about about university?



To be eligible for selection into a university course, students must:

- Qualify for the SACE
- Obtain an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR)
- Meet any prerequisite subject requirements for the course/program



What is an ATAR?

- The Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) is a rank given to students on a range from 0 to 99.95
- Universities use the ATAR to select students for their courses
- The ATAR shows how a student performed in their studies compared to other students.
- E.g. an ATAR of 95 means you performed as well as, or better, than 95% of students that year
- To get an ATAR you must get your SACE.






Adjustment Factors



Students who successfully complete 1 or more of the following subjects are eligible to receive a maximum of 4 additional points to be factored into their ATAR – 2 points for 1 eligible subject or 4 points for 2 or more eligible subjects.

NB: Due to the competitive nature, most Medical courses will only offer places based on a student's ATAR before any adjustment factors.

- 20 credits of a Language Other Than English
- Stage 2 English or English Literary Studies
- Stage 2 Mathematical Methods
- Stage 2 Specialist Mathematics



Choosing Year 11 & Year 12 subjects


When choosing subjects, students should ask themselves:

- What subjects do I need to study to follow my career pathway?




Pattern of Subjects at Year 11 - General

Pattern of Subjects at Year 11- SIM



Pattern of Subjects at Year 11 - VET

- Year 11 VET students undertake 5 compulsory semester courses, a VET course and 5 elective semester subjects:
 - English (choice) 2 semesters
 - Research Practice & Research Project 2 semesters
 - Mathematics (choice) 1 semester
 - VET Course 2 semesters
 - Choice subject 1 semester
 - Choice subject 1 semester



Pattern of Subjects at Year 12

- All students need to complete a minimum of 70 credits at Stage 2, however, to qualify for an ATAR, you must have 90 credits
- For non-VET students, this means you will need to study 4 full-year subjects (20 credits each)
- For VET students, this means you will need to study 3 full-year subjects plus the VET course



Recommendations



- Mathematics, Science and English recommendations have been completed for all students
- Outdoor Educations recommendations have been done for those students who have completed Outdoor Education.
- These recommendations are now available as a document in Daymap, and are located where you find your reports
- Students are expected to choose subjects in line with these recommendations.
- The Senior School team will identify students who have gone against recommendations and follow a process which includes a form.



There are 26 FIPs including over 150 VET qualifications.

Each FIP will include one or more VET qualifications at Certificate II or III level

Some qualifications are delivered 'onjob' (traineeship or apprenticeship) or 'off-job' (classroom-based learning)


Most qualifications are delivered one day per week, unless you decide you want to set it up as a traineeships/apprenticeship which includes employment one day per week minimum(7.5 hrs)

- Students can begin their FIP in year 10 (through an apprenticeship or traineeship only), year 11 or year 12.
- > VET courses contribute to completion of the SACE.
- Students who begin a FIP may move between different pathway options during secondary school.
- Students on a FIP may also transition from year 12 to further study or higher education (university).



- Students can commence an apprenticeship or traineeship in years 10, 11 or 12 for qualifications that are delivered "on the job".
- SBATs combine senior secondary school with vocational education and training (VET) and paid employment.
- Student attend school for agreed subjects, participate in on-the-job training in the workplace and formal VET with a Nominated Training Organisation (NTO)
- Learning in school and attending work is balanced between the needs of the student, the employer and the school.
- VET/SBAT can provide up to 150 of the 200 required SACE credits.

What is the difference between an apprenticeship and a traineeship?



Both allow you to learn while you earn. You train on the job, study and earn an income all while working towards a qualification.



An apprenticeship normally takes 3-4 years in traditional trade areas like carpentry, electrical, hairdressing and plumbing.



A traineeship lasts 1 – 2 years, in areas such as office administration, information technology or hospitality.

VET Enrolment Process (VETRO)

All students will be required to complete VETRO to access VET qualifications as part of the FIP.

Online enrolment process which involves registration and evidence of pathway readiness.

Helps identify any support that a student may need to commence and complete their pathway.
