House Logo Presentation



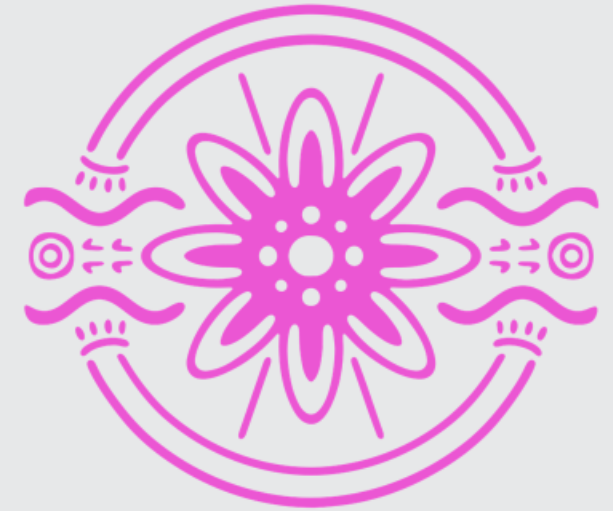


Tarnta means male red kangaroo in Kurna.  
The artwork is based around a strong kangaroo with a meeting place at its heart and around the outside, representing home and a sense of belonging.



There are six symbols of people which represent the six year levels within our house.

The footprints and small lines represent a journey of collaboration and connection throughout our house. In the centre is a Tantutiti, which is the Kaurua word for native lilac, and represents the final stage of connection where we all come together.



The Karrkala, which is Kaurna for pig face plant flower, is at the centre of the design to represent 'home'. The symbols around the flower represent the path or journey to finding home or a place to belong, and lead to a meeting place, represented by the circles on the sides.





Yarlu is the Kurna word for the sea or ocean, which is represented by the water holes in the middle of the artwork. The jellyfish is a spiritual animal that tend to stick together as a group, so they represent the free spirit and connectedness of our house.



The meeting place symbols around the outside of the artwork represents our school and different places we are connected to within our community. The water lines represent our location being close to the ocean. The flower at the centre is Mirnu, which is the Kurna word for golden wattle.



The symbols for people on the outside and the lines on the inside represent the people, diversity and connection within our house. Wilya is the Kurna word for leaves, which are featured in the centre of the artwork.
